#### The Round up of previous events:

Last year saw a growth of membership to seventy-two enjoying many social activities including table tennis, croquet, skittles, 'Explore Your Local Area', tennis, theatre trips, outings, singing, whist, craft, 'ladies who lunch' and quizzes.

Since my last report we have had two very entertaining talks where we learnt about the charity, 'Freewheelers', which transports (by motor bike) essential supplies between hospitals & to recent outpatients, & were given tips on Watercolour Painting by a local artist. We also had an enjoyable Christmas party hosted by the committee.

Our skittles team accepted a challenge from the County W.I. Trustees to a match in Puriton. After a slow start, Walton won by 26 pins in a light-hearted contest. The team has also continued to perform well in the W.I. County Cup this year with a win by 56 pins against Lympsham played in Sexeys Arms Inn in Wedmore. In November six members attended the County AGM in Taunton where our skittles captain received the W.I. County Cup on behalf of the team & a dual member was recognised as a fully qualified W.I. Adviser.

There were also two very interesting speakers: Andy Marsh, the Chief Constable of Avon & Somerset, & Mandy Hickson, an ex RAF fighter pilot & instructor, who both used film to illustrate their talks. In addition, during that month twenty members attended the Remembrance Ceremony at Walton Cross followed by a service in the Holy Trinity Church

Four members travelled to Wilton Lodge in Taunton to sort & pack copies of the County News for distribution to participating Somerset W.I.s.

The period coming up to Christmas was also a very busy time for our singers who performed at the Glastonbury Frost Fayre, the Group Carol Service in Westonzoyland, the W.I. County Carol Service in Wells & in Northleaze in Street.

Other activities included our 'Explore Your Local Area' which was a guided tour around the Information Centre in Wells, the 'Ladies Who Lunch' who were once again in the Two Brewers & sixteen craft enthusiasts had a day out at Mottisfont Abbey in Hertfordshire to see the Kaffe Forsett quilt & knitting exhibition along with a day decorating baubles for their Christmas trees.

Twenty ladies made our annual winter trip by bus to the Bristol Hippodrome, this time to see a matinee performance of the very amusing pantomime Aladdin, starring Joe Pasquale & Marti Pellow, which also included a highly effective 3D section.

In January we had an enjoyable home kurling session in Walton Village Hall & ran an away session for Woolavington W.I. in their village hall. Our annual meal, attended by thirty eight members, was held in the Unicorn in Somerton.

#### Neighbourhood Watch By Bob Musgrave

Now that Spring is with us, the criminal element in our society know there will be a ready sale for all sorts of gardening equipment and already we are seeing an upsurge in theft from sheds and outbuildings. The first important action to safeguard our sheds is to fit a good quality lock on the door and then actually lock it. The next action is to then think about how the door is attached to the shed.

Most shed door hinges are attached with conventional screws but these can be quickly removed with a screwdriver and the complete door removed. However there is a cheap and effective way of preventing this by replacing just two of these screws per hinge, - one in each of the two parts of the hinge -with coach bolts. (These bolts have a large head without any screwdriver slot, so they cannot be unscrewed from outside.) By making it difficult to gain entry, the average opportunist villain will abandon that site and go looking for an easier target.

Another recent crime involves fraudsters creating fake adverts for supposed modelling opportunities for children. Fraudsters will inform parents or guardians that a potential career in modelling awaits their child and this tactic can persuade the parent to sign up and send an advance registration fee.

The fraudsters will also convince the victim that they will need to have a portfolio and

offer a variety of packages which have to be paid for in advance. Those who agree and buy into this scheme will have lost their money because no such scheme actually exists. Surprising though this may sound, during August 2017 a total of 49 such frauds were reported to Action Fraud with a total loss of £71,000.

is continuing to meet and starting to prepare a draft outline for the plan. What this means is that over the next few months ideas for main policy areas will be looked at and an overall 'vision statement' of how residents would like their village and surrounding areas to look in the next ten years or so, will be drafted.

This could include areas such as increasing the size of the school, protecting and improving green spaces, supporting small businesses and much more.

Consultation will be ongoing with Walton Primary School and village hall user groups being approached over the next few months.



It is hoped to have a draft of the plan available for everyone to see at the next Annual Meeting of the Parish in May 2018 when entertainment will include performances by Walton School and other local talent.

Neighbourhood planning was introduced by the Localism Act in November 2011. It is a way for communities to decide the future of the places where they live and work. It enables local communities to have more say in where new houses, businesses, shops and community facilities should go in their local area and can allocate sites for development. They may also include more detailed planning policies, for example to define how new development should look.



What a Neighbourhood Plan can and cannot do:

### A Neighbourhood Plan can...

- Decide where and what type of development should happen in the neighbourhood
- Promote more development than is set out in the Local Plan
- Include policies, for example regarding design standards, that take precedence over existing policies in the Local Plan for the neighbourhood provided the Neighbourhood Plan policies do not conflict with the strategic policies in the Local Plan.

### A Neighbourhood Plan cannot...

- Conflict with the strategic policies in the Local Plan prepared by the local planning authority
- Be used to prevent development that is included in the Local Plan
- Introduce new speed limits or traffic calming methods

Knit & Natter was born out of the above group and is held on the third Wednesday of the month, also in the village hall lounge between 2pm and 4pm.





#### Finances...

Following our recent Gift Day appeal in October and the positive response from the community, we have had a reoccurring question regarding the general finances of the church. People are asking as to how we are in a potentially difficult financial situation when the Church of England appears to be a wealthy organisation, lots of assets, buildings and churches?

The simple fact is that whilst the 'Church', the Church of England may be in that position we are not. We as a Parish Church, whilst under the 'Church' umbrella have to effectively be self-sufficient. That is the running of the church building and all that happens in and around it. In fact, we also have to pay what is called a Parish Share, which is a contribution towards the Clergy salaries, pensions etc. We also contribute to the cost of running the Church Office including a part-time Administrator.

In our case, the exception is the 'Old' graveyard that surrounds the building. This is 'closed' - no further burials take place. The 'Closed' graveyard is maintained by, and the responsibility of the Council. Current burials are in the 'New' graveyard, behind the church. We have benefited from a regular small grant, for which we are very grateful ,from Walton Parish Council who help us to maintain the graveyard. At Christmas the Parish Council also give us a small sum of money towards the lighting of the church tower at Christmas, as part of the 'Village street scene'. Other than that, we are dependant on the 'giving' of our small regular congregation and donations from the community, supporters and 'friends' of the church.
