The Somerset Bus Partnership has welcomed the Government's decision to provide an additional £75 million. This will enable bus operators to continue to cap their single adult bus fares at £2.

The £2 flat fare introduced in January is now set to continue through to the end of June. Bus users in Somerset will be able to continue to travel on most bus routes in the county and beyond for just £2.

It's worth remembering that this initiative applies to cross-boundary services, which means you can travel for example from Street to Bristol or Wells to Bath or Frome to Bath for just £2. It's hoped this will persuade even more people to use the buses

Walton Parish Council PRECEPT GRANTS

Every year the Parish Council gives grants to groups and organisations that are of benefit to the village.

The process starts in the Autumn of every year when the Precept Grants are advertised on the website and village notice boards, and groups are able to apply. In the past recipients have included the men's shed, the netball group, brownies groups, scouts, cadets and many others.

The grant applications are discussed at the normal parish council meetings in order that anyone can comment, and any grants that are agreed are paid in April at the start of the financial year. This year grants were awarded to:

- The Walton Under 5's pre-school, £648 for new play equipment & chairs.
- The Dorset & Somerset Air Ambulance, £500 for a replacement piece of life saving equipment.
- The Holy Trinity Church, £774 toward the upkeep of the Church yard and floodlighting the village clock.
- St Margaret's Hospice, £500 contributing toward the cost of caring for people with life-limiting illnesses in their own homes.
- Citizen's Advice Mendip, £100 for training and equipping their volunteers in order that they can continue to provide essential advice, aiding people in accessing the services they need.
- Walton Speed watch group, £150 to promote road safety.



On March 31st we had a special visitor at preschool...Ofsted! The inspector spent the day with us talking to parents and children about the preschool and observing our experienced staff delivering exciting play activities and interacting with our children. We were holding our Easter picnic for the children and their families that

day, so it was a great opportunity for the inspector to see first-hand the close links we have with our families. We think it was also the first time the inspector had seen a manager dress up as the bunny for the children's egg hunt!

Following the inspection, the new preschool committee along with our new manager, Cassie Needle, and all the preschool staff, are delighted to inform you that we achieved outstanding across all the four areas of inspection and that

Walton Under 5s Preschool is now officially rated as Outstanding by Ofsted.

The four areas assessed were quality of education, behaviour and attitudes, personal development and leadership and management. The inspector noted that our staff are "ambitious and passionate " and that parents feel "valued by staff ". But above all, we were incredibly proud to read her observations of our wonderful children. commenting that "children's behaviour is superb" showing "exceptional care and concern to their friends,

the resources and the environment".

The following day we held our first Easter Family Fun Day. This proved to be a tremendously successful event and we were overwhelmed by the turnout. Children enjoyed an Easter scavenger



hunt and a range of art and craft activities, whilst there was a quiz for the adults. A range of stalls, enormous jumble sale and delicious refreshments were enjoyed by all. The chocolate tombola, however, was a definite hit with all who attended!



We managed to raise over £800 from the event which will go towards purchasing some exciting

new resources for the children. We'd like to thank everyone who kindly donated jumble or chocolate prizes, along the following local businesses for their kind donations and support: Glastonbury Abbey, Burns the Bread, Crystal Clear, Earthfare, Pets at Home, Tesco and Lidl.




All are welcome in our churchyard and why not also pop into the church, the spiritual heart of our community, which is open every day.
